

Beaubien Woods Forest Preserve is home to several 100+ year-old oak trees, high-quality prairie, oak savanna, and wetland habitat, and hundreds of species of native plants and migratory birds. There are many ways to enjoy this 135-acre preserve. A hiking trail on the north end takes you through a mix of woodland and prairie habitats to Flatfoot Lake at the center of the site. The area has a rich history as a former farmstead and location on the Underground Railroad. We invite you to get to know your Cook County Forest Preserve using this field guide.

Land Acknowledgement

Beaubien Woods Forest Preserve sits on the traditional homelands of the Three Fires Confederacy, collectively known as the Anishnabek (or Anishenabe) people: the Ojibwe, Odawa, and Bodéwadmiké (Potawatomi), and Inoka (Illini Confederacy) and Myaamia (Miami) people. This region near Lake Michigan was a site for trade, gathering, and healing for more than a dozen Native tribes. The word 'Calumet' is thought to be derived from the ceremonial peace pipe used by native peoples of the region. We offer respect and gratitude to the diverse Indigenous people that still reside here and across the region, as well as their ancestors, and recognize, share and celebrate their immemorial ties to this land.

Cheryl Johnson | People for Community Recovery (PCR)

Founded in 1979 by Cheryl's mother, Hazel Johnson, to fight for environmental justice (EJ) in and around Altgeld Gardens, PCR and Cheryl continue that legacy today. Hazel is often considered the mother of the national EJ movement, demanding reforms to protect communities of color like Altgeld that are disproportionately affected by environmental hazards.

Beaubien Woods Forest Preserve



Beaubien is part of the Calumet Region, an area spanning Illinois and Northwest Indiana along the southern tip of Lake Michigan. Few places weave together life and landscape as distinctively as the bi-state Calumet region, a tapestry of people, industry, and globally significant nature. Beaubien is encircled by the Little Calumet River, the Bishop Ford Freeway, landfills, and Altgeld Gardens.

Beaubien Natural Communities

There are nearly nine acres of high-quality prairie at Beaubien, predominantly composed of tall, perennial, native grasses. Only about .01% of the original prairie in Illinois remains.



Prairie Community



1 Rattlesnake Master Eryngium yuccifolium The scientific name of this plant, means "like yucca leaves."



2 Common Milkweed Asclepias syriaca The most common milkweed, its leaves are the food for monarch caterpillars.



3 Big Bluestem Andropogon gerardii The state grass of Illinois, also called "turkey foot," due to the shape of its seedhead.

Beaubien Natural Communities

Before European settlement, Beaubien Woods was a wet prairie and open savanna community. The oak savannas of the Midwest form a transition zone between the drier Great Plains to the west and the broadleaf forests to the east. There are five acres of oak savanna at Beaubien today.

4 Bur Oak Quercus macrocarpa Provides habitat for hundreds of living organisms and works as a backbone to the ecosystem.

5 Bottle Brush Grass Elymus hystrix Produces beautiful seed heads that resemble a brush; does well with dappled sunlight.

Spring Beauty *Claytonia virginica* Spring ephemerals like the *Spring beauty* is a sign of spring.

Beaubien has large areas of wet prairie, a 15-acre man-made lake, and is adjacent to the Little Calumet River. Great egrets are known to gather here, and you can find evidence of beavers having chewed on wood for their lodges in Flatfoot Lake (named for its shape).



Wetland Community



7 Largemouth Bass Micropterus salmoides Largemouth bass, bluegill, and redear sunfish are commonly stocked in the lake.



8 Buttonbush Cephalanthus occidentalis This native wetland shrub attracts 24 birds and numerous butterfly species.



9 Blue Flag Iris Iris virginica shrevei The blue-violet flowers are striking in wetlands, blooming late spring to early summer.

Points of Interest at Beaubien



Boat Launch

Provides a scenic overlook and is located at E 132nd St, east of S Greenwood Ave, Chicago, IL 60827. The parking lot and ramp allow access to the Little Calumet River and will have interpretive signage and a small pavilion in late 2022.



Osprey Nesting Platform Near Boat Launch Keep your eyes to the sky in warmer months for these fish-eating raptors, as well as for bald eagles that have been known to fly overhead.



Gathering Space "Prairie Boat" Designed by sculptors Christine Perri and Roman Villareal, in partnership with Imani Village, this artistic gathering space will provide a beautiful place to convene and view the waterfront (coming late 2022).



Picnic Shelter The pavilion provides a sheltered spot for visitors and views of the lake. A portable bathroom is located next to the picnic shelter and is usually available May1st to October 31st.

Mighty Acorns Students and Habitat Volunteers

Nearby Points of Interest



Jon Ton Farm and Underground Railroad

"Freedom seekers" escaping slavery found refuge with local abolitionists and Dutch immigrants Jon and Aagje Ton whose 40-acre farm was located adjacent to Beaubien on the north bank of the Little Calumet River from the 1840s until the Civil War. In 2019, the National Park Service formally included the Farm Site in the National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom registry.



Altgeld Gardens and Golden Gate To the west of the site, built in 1945 for returning World War II veterans, Altgeld Gardens was one of the nation's first public housing developments and is still a vibrant, predominantly African-American community today, alongside neighboring Golden Gate homes and duplexes.



Calumet Heritage Area Efforts are underway to establish a Calumet National Heritage Area. The heritage area showcases the assets

heritage area showcases the assets of this unique American region, and Beaubien Woods is a part of that story. Pullman National Monument and Big Marsh are two other nearby natural areas of interest.



African American Heritage Water Trail The Water Trail, which begins at the boat launch, honors the legacy and stories of African Americans who settled along the river. The Little Calumet River is part of the system that connects Lake Michigan with the Mississippi.
